

Dear Friends

On May 8, 1945, as ordinary people (along with my dad) gathered in Belfast city centre, in towns and small villages such as Saintfield, the guns finally fell silent across Europe. Nazi Germany had surrendered and the world, scarred by war, breathed a sigh of relief. Victory in Europe Day—VE Day—was not just a military victory. It was a deeply human moment offering a glimpse of hope through peace restored and new freedom won for all.

Eighty years on, this freedom still invites us to give thanks for those who laid down their lives as well as those who came home forever changed by what they had seen and endured. Men and women from every part of the Commonwealth and other democracies had stood together to ensure we would not live under dictatorship. On May 8th we honour them—with gratitude, joy and clear mandate of ensuring 'never again'.

In April we however also marked another anniversary of liberation. the liberation of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp. A place of such inhuman suffering, where Allied soldiers when they entered uncovered the raw power of human cruelty—starvation, disease, torture and death. Belsen revealed a human darkness that the light of liberation broke through, so that those who witnessed its horror and those who lived through its pain also promised 'never again'.

In May 2025, the remembrance of V.E. day with its victory, the true horror of the battlefield being counted by who didn't come home, hidden death camps being revealed and the destruction of the ordinary way of life for too many people, our remembrance must always recognises the cost of that freedom won for us, rather than something we could achieve for ourselves.

In Galatians 5:1, Paul writes: "It is for freedom that Christ has set us free." Such freedom is not only political—it is deeply spiritual. Christ came to break every chain of fear, hatred, sin and even death. His victory was not won with weapons, but with a cross. It did not just change history—it changed and still does change hearts as Jesus says, 'never again' for those who in him are set free.

So in this 80th year, let us ask ourselves as we say 'never again'.

- Are we still living in the freedom that was won for us?
- Do we fully reject the chains of hatred, racism and divisions that threaten to creep back in to our countries and politics?
- Do we recognise our calling to be peacemakers, bridge-builders, and freedom-bringers in our own generation?

This May, let us be people not just of nostalgia, but of deep resolve. Let us celebrate May 8th not just as a moment in time, but a way of life. Life shaped by the freedom Christ offers. Life that set others free through our determination as people, a nation and democracy of 'never again' Amen.









Lord of peace,

On this 80th anniversary of VE Day, we thank You for the freedom won at such great cost. We remember with honour those who fought, and with sorrow those who suffered.

We remember the victims of war and genocide. May we never forget.

May we never grow cold to the gift of freedom.

On Mother's Day we all made beautiful heart rings in church to remember all the ladies who are in our lives, past and present.




Saintfield Parish 250th update

1776 - 2026











2026 is a very significant year for Saintfield Parish as it will mark the 250th Anniversary of the Parish Church being consecrated for worship. It's the same year as the American Declaration of independence (July 4th) as well as the year when John Constable (the painter) was born.

The Select Vestry have been discussing how this Anniversary could be used to both celebrate our past but also help us en-vision the future 25 years. We want this mixture of 250th 'moments' to see where we have come from, generations of faithfulness that provided us with so much today. However, we must see the good foundations we must lay for future congregations as they also 'Speak Jesus' in new and relevant ways to all the community of Saintfield.

So far, some key Sundays are already in the Diary with the Archbishop of Armagh John Mc Dowell being with us for our main Service of Celebration in March 2026. Our own bishop David is with us at Harvest and our Holy Week will have a range of preachers to lead and guide us from God's Word.

Another key events will focus on a History Weekend in June (rather like the one we had for the Platinum Celebration for our late Queen Elizabeth II). Other events will take place in different seasons of the year and we will invite the Saintfield Community to be part of what is happening.

I hope and pray that our partnership with Pastor David in La Paz, Bolivia will be deepened with a possible visit to that Church and its congregation. SAMS Ireland are happy to explore this with us.

We are considering 1 or 2 merchandise to mark the year maybe with Christmas Cards and other items people might buy. We don't necessarily want to have 'pens, pencils and knick-knacks' but items that people might want to keep.

There is much to pray over and plan.

The Select Vestry will be sending a letter to each household in the Parish to invite people to be part of the organisation of such events. The Church Services are reasonably easy to manage, but the community events will need more people in teams to take on the demands of helping make things happen. Please read that letter and consider how you can best help.
